President's Column

Four times a year, chapter leaders and representatives come together as the PFLAG Council of Northern Illinois to discuss upcoming events, to exchange ideas about improving our chapters, to plan events such as the upcoming November 8 workshop day, and most importantly, to build relationships among our chapters in the greater Chicagoland area, to unify the PFLAG voice in Northern Illinois. On October 18 we met, and the first order of business was to elect officers who would guide the council for the next two years. The nominating committee presented the following slate, which was endorsed by the council:

President: Toni Weaver (McHenry)
Vice-president: John Hickey (DuPage)
Secretary: Sue Ginsburg (Deerfield)
Treasurer: Tony Dornacher (at-large)

We are in the midst of our Fall membership drive, and we hope to exceed the 150 memberships we received last year. Every \$45 membership sends \$20 back to the member's chapter, reason enough for encouraging folks to become "official"! \$10 of each membership is returned to the council, out of which we pay for liability insurance for all the chapters, the expenses related to the website and helpline, entry fees for the Chicago Pride Parade and related costs associated with a float, and assistance to chapters that do not have the funds to buy their own PFLAG materials. Since the monthly newsletter, Open Doors, is now published solely on-line, we no longer have the cost of printing and mailing, a considerable savings. Finally, \$15 is sent to PFLAG National for membership in the parent organization. If you have not yet renewed or begun a membership, please take a moment now to go to www.pflagillinois.org to sign up.

Patty Dillon of Equality Illinois is an at-large member of the council, and she presents an update on the current activities of EqIL at each meeting. Right now, EqII is very involved in getting out the vote. Their website www.eqil.org has a wealth of information about voting and candidates as well as copious resources of interest to LGBT people and their allies. We value this working relationship with an organization that makes such a huge difference in our state.

Tony Dornacher explained to us a giving program offered by Amazon. Amazon will give one-half of one percent of the purchase amount if we shop using this website: www.smile.amazon.com and select the PFLAG Council of Northern Illinois as the recipient of the donation. Admittedly, the percentage is small, but if we all did our Amazon shopping using the "smile.amazon.com" site, the money would add up. What an easy and painless way to donate extra funds to the council. I've already used it, and there's nothing to it.

One last topic of discussion at the council meeting was PFLAG National's intention to drop the spelling out of the acronym (Parents, Families, and Friends of Lesbians and Gays) in the interest of being more inclusive. However, the majority of those present at the council meeting felt that name recognition is already a problem (How many times have you been greeted with a blank stare when you say that you represent PFLAG?). We would rather add "bisexual and transgender" like this: PFLAG - Parents, Family and Friends of Lesbians and Gays, Bisexual and Transgender.

However, it appears that the change is already underway and will be confirmed at the annual meeting on October 24.

The next council meeting, which all are invited to attend, will be on January 17, weather permitting. PFLAG Oak Park hosts the meetings at the First United Church of Oak Park, 848 Lake St., 10AM-1:30PM.

I would be remiss if I failed to mention the National Transgender Day of Remembrance, which this year falls on November 20. We hold those who have been violently murdered for their gender identity in our hearts and pray fervently for the day when all of our LGBT loved ones can stand up, free from fear, and openly be who they are.

What's Happening in Our Chapters?

HINSDALE CHAPTER

Our October guest was Dr. Bonnie Estensen from *Guided Path Psychological Services*. She works extensively with LGBTQ clients and was our guest speaker for the second time. She told us that many counselors aren't adequately trained in their masters and doctoral programs to counsel LGBTQ people looking for psychological support. Guided Path and Dr. Bonnie conduct training programs and offer support for clients during transition. Dr. Bonnie teaches at Aurora University in their masters counseling program.

During our Book Corner, a couple books were recommended: This Is a Book for Parents of Gay Kids: A Question & Answer Guide to Everyday Life is by Dannielle Owens-Reid and Kristin Russo. This book, written in a Q&A format, is a resource for parents on both emotional and practical topics. The Miseducation of Cameron Post, by emily danforth, is a young adult novel set in rural Montana in the early 1990s. Cameron Post loses both her parents and lives with her grandmother and ultraconservative aunt who sent her to a religious conversion camp when they learn she is gay.

Members were reminded that we'd continue our service for the Crib, part of the Night Ministry, at our December holiday potluck. After enjoying a holiday dinner with each other, we'll collect personal items, including travel size shampoo, soap, and toothpaste, toothbrushes, combs, first aid kits, full size deodorant, socks, warm gloves and caps, hard candy, gum, playing cards, hand lotion, pens and small note pads. Our November scheduled speaker is Jose Rios, a Chicago police officer who is an advocate for the LGBT community.



DEERFIELD CHAPTER

Despite a smaller number of attendees at our October meeting, we viewed a video called "We Are Dad," the story of two gay male pediatric AIDS nurses who decided to foster 3 HIV babies. The challenges that this family has overcome are many. After 12 years in this loving home, the State of Florida is now trying to take back one of the children after he presented as HIV negative. The film showed the absolute indifference of a State to the welfare of a child. It was more important to take the child away from gay parents. The truth being that the State of Florida, by its own statistics, has actually LOST 3,000 children from the Department of Children. Yet, they wanted this 12-year-old child back to adopt him to a "real" family, now that he was AIDS free. It's a struggle still going on, defended by the ACLU.

Our September speakers Dr. Michael Newcomb and Antonia Clifford of IMPACT Health & Development (www.impactprogram.org) at Northwestern University were excellent. They described research they were involved in with LGBTQ youth, and how they find their interviewees for the projects. They partner with other local organizations such as TransLife Center, Vida SIDA and Center on Halsted for some of their projects.

On October 19, together with HRC we screened "I Stand Corrected" (http://istandcorrectedmovie.com/) about

trans jazz bass player, Jennifer Leitham (http://www.jenniferleitham.com/) and her transition from John to Jennifer. There were 40-60 people at the screening, most of who stayed for the Q & A afterwards. Questions ranged from her development as a musician to gossip about jazz musicians she knows or has known. She has a warm friendly manner that brings the audience into her circle. Afterwards we had the after party with Jennifer giving us a wonderful performance. She also taught us about about basses especially her traveling bass. She was able to sell quite a few of her CDs after performing. If you ever get a chance to see this film do so. You won't be sorry.

At our meeting today, Oct. 27, our guest speaker was Kelly Morrissy of Kelly Electrolysis Inc

(http://www.izapem.com/.) She has been an electrologist for over 25 years. Over the years she has built up a practice specializing in trans women, and people with dark skin. When she first started, few electrologists would accept trans women as clients. She has become the goto person for the performers at Baton as well as other trans women.

Kelly is an enthusiastic and well-informed speaker. She told us about the way that one's hormones affect one's hair growth. The electrolysis process kills the hair follicle, but because hair follicles are dormant until the body's hormones compel it to grow, one usually returns to have addition treatments in the same area.

On Oct. 25, five of us went to the Oak Park Area Lesbian and Gay Association's (OPALGA) 25th Anniversary Gala. It was a lovely event. Greg Harris, Don Harmon and Tracy Baim received Opal Awards for their work in bringing marriage equality to Illinois. Part of the proceeds of the banquet will be given to the Lakeside Pride Freedom Marching Band (http://www.lakesidepride.org/) and to the Oak Park Historical Society who will be receiving OPALGA's archives. The Gala also raised over \$6000 for youth scholarships.

PTI CHICAGO CHAPTER

The Chicago chapter of PTI met on Thursday, October 9 at The Center on Halsted. Speakers Antonia Clifford and J.A. Puckett of IMPACT, The LGBT Health and Development Program, which is run through the Department of Medical Social Sciences at the Feinberg School of Medicine, joined us. According to IMPACT's mission statement, the organization conducts translational research with the goals of improving the health of LGBTQ individuals, further understanding the development of gender identity and sexual orientation, and translating their research findings back into the community.

J.A Puckett is a clinical psychologist and post-doctoral fellow with IMPACT. They spoke to our group about a longitudinal study that they are involved in which tracks the effects of social stressors and stigma on the mental health of individuals in the transgender community. Being that this is a translational study, the research results will ultimately be used to inform clinical work by therapists and physicians, legislation, and policy matters. Antonia Clifford spoke about IMPACT's interactive website, various blogs, and additional areas of LGBTQ research.

In addition to our speakers, the group discussed the upcoming PFLAG workshop on November 8 at Countryside Unitarian Church, which will provide an opportunity to meet others and gain education and insight on transgender issues. The group also discussed matters of personal concern as we continue to parent our transgender children.

The McHenry Chapter sponsored Crystal Lake Central High School's Gay Straight Alliance advisor, Tamara, so that she could participate in a conference by Joe Kort on Gay Affirmative Psychotherapy. Tamara came to our October meeting to tell us about the conference and Central's GSA.

Tamara shared this: Gay Affirmative Psychotherapy's position is that there is nothing wrong with the person who is GLBTQ. What is wrong is society's reaction to the person. Kort says that being GLBTQ is more than a sexual matter. It is affectional, psychological, emotional, spiritual and romantic as well. The daylong conference covered homophobia, heterosexism, and Post Traumatic Stress Disorder. Some GLBTQ people are under so much societal stress that they exhibit signs of PTSD.

A lot of persistence was needed on Tamara's part to get the GSA authorized by the high school's administration. We enjoyed hearing her story and look forward to supporting Tamara and Central's GSA in the future.

Our second speaker was one of our PFLAG members, Sam Abersekera, who serves on the board of **The Legacy Project**. The Legacy Project is the only outdoor LGBT museum walk in the world. Sam told us about the beautiful bronze plaques that are on the pylons on North Halstead Street in Boystown. The plaques commemorate LGBT persons who have played important roles in our society. She told us about Jane Adams, Alan Turing (the father of computer science), Eleanor Roosevelt, and others. We enjoyed her interesting and informative presentation. Check out their website,

A PFLAG MEMBER YOU SHOULD KNOW . . .

Hinsdale PFLAG Chapter member Kristin Thompson is surrounded with support from fellow Hinsdale Chapter members Ron Weidhuner, Bob Cammarata, Carole Weidhuner and Marcia Prichason as she skates with the Aurora 88s Roller Derby Skate Team.

Kristin, whose roller derby name is *Slay Agenda #15*, is a relative newcomer to the sport. She became hooked when a friend brought her to see a bout and encouraged her to participate. Kristin's skate name, like so many others in "derbyverse," is a play on words. She states, "As someone who identifies as queer/gay, I wanted to show it. So, it's meant to sound like 'gay agenda' because everyone knows that's not a real thing." Kristin also chose the #15 because Illinois was the 15th state to pass marriage equality.

Joining roller derby necessitates a great deal of dedication. In addition to knowing the basics of skating, each skater must learn a complicated set of rules. Each rule is designed to keep the sport intense and tough while at the same time maintaining player safety. Plus, there is a comprehensive training program that involves passing three rigorous programs before someone is rostered.

Kristin admits to going through the painstaking training program three times before she was finally rostered. Not only did she have to learn the basics, she also went to games and events and practiced on her own before she was finally able to pass the 27n5, arguably one of the hardest skills to pass. The skater must skate 27 laps in five minutes. On paper, that doesn't sound very difficult, but Kristin relates that "it really tests your endurance; you have to keep a quick, steady pace even when your legs feel like jello and you want to pass out three quarters of the way through."

After months of hard work and dedication, Kristin fulfilled her dream of skating with the Aurora 88's. She says it was "a long tough road that still continues. Each practice I do my best to improve myself to be the biggest asset I can be for my team."

Kristin also felt that having her PFLAG family come out and cheer her on at her second bout was extremely meaningful. She says that getting the support from PFLAG members helps her stay motivated. She intends to keep on skating as "Slay Agenda #15," an out and proud gay/queer roller derbyer for many years.
