President's Column

Believing versus Acting

Perhaps in anticipation of a favorable ruling by the Supreme Court that would allow same-sex couples to marry, The "First Amendment Defense Act" (H.R. 2802) was introduced in the The bill reads, in part "Notwithstanding any other provision of law, the Federal Government shall not take any discriminatory action against a person, wholly or partially on the basis that such person <u>believes or acts</u> (emphasis mine) in accordance with a religious belief or moral conviction that marriage is or should be recognized as the union of one man and one woman, or that sexual relations are properly reserved to such a marriage."

I'm so angry I could spit. This bill, if passed, would prevent repercussions to the very people who have been discriminating against our loved ones for so long. Why should my son suffer an affront to his dignity as a person, as a human being, from a person claiming a "religious objection" when he comes to the county clerk's office to obtain a marriage license and is refused? People are free to <u>believe</u> anything they please, but they are not free to <u>act</u> upon their belief when fulfilling the duties in the public sphere where their salaries are being paid by taxpayer dollars. They must <u>act</u> in accordance with the law regardless of what they <u>believe</u>. There should be repercussions because that clerk is not fulfilling the duties required of him/her by law.

Furthermore, this bill, if passed, would prevent the Federal government from withholding grants to religious institutions that object to same-sex marriage. In other words, these institutions want to have their cake and eat it, too. They're saying, in essence, give us Federal money but let us abide by our own rules, <u>believing and acting</u> as we deem fit.

This is unacceptable. The separation of church and state comes into play here. Let the churches fund their own programs if they feel so strongly about this issue. Raise the money from the people in the pews. Let them support their own programs and thus free themselves from the need for government funding.

We must not be silent as friends and family – are religious war. We've fought victory. We mustn't let it be making it legal for people continue the discrimination

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Northern Illinois Council News

Seventeen folks representing McHenry, McHenry PTI, Chicago PTI, Hinsdale, Oak Park, Deerfield, Aurora/Fox Valley, DuPage, and Equality Illinois gathered on July 18 for our quarterly council meeting.

Mike Ziri (EqII) explained three bills currently sitting on Governor Rauner's desk awaiting his signature. They are HB 217 (the Youth Mental Health Protection Act which would outlaw conversion therapy), HB 3552 which pertains to the disposition of one's remains and the requirement that a person's indicated gender identity be listed on the legal documents pertain to one's death, and HB 3930 which amends the Illinois Hate Crime Statute to include gender identity. Everyone is encouraged to contact the governor's office asking for his support for these bills.

Mike also spoke about cuts to the social services budget as it pertains to people who have HIV/AIDS and are dependent upon state aid to cover their medication expenses. The problem arises because of the way the anti-retroviral drugs act. Resistance to a drug occurs rapidly when a person misses even a single dose. If this happens repeatedly, a person may run out of options for drug therapy.

Jim Levie (Deerfield) was unanimously voted into the office of treasurer, stepping into the shoes of Tony Dornacher who has served in that capacity 2010. Tony and his husband to be will be relocating to Seattle sometime in early 2016. Tony will be working with Jim during the transition process.

Don Donahue (DuPage) was introduced as the new membership chair, another post previously held by Tony D.

Memorial contributions honoring the memory of past council presidents John Larson and Barbara Schon-Lundberg have been sitting in the council's treasury since their passing. Because the money was not enough to form a sustaining scholarship fund, the council voted to contribute the funds to the 750 Club, an endeavor begun by Tracy Baim (Windy City Times) to house homeless LGBT youth.

New chapters are forming or are in the process of forming, and additional inquiries are being received. There's a new Downers Grove chapter, fully affiliated with National but not with council. Tinley Park has been exploring the feasibility of forming a chapter, and inquiries have come from Peoria, Elgin, and Evanston.

The heart of every council meeting centers on what's happening in our chapters. Council meetings provide the opportunity for chapter leaders to trade ideas and use one another as sounding boards for improving our chapters. It's always the best part of the day!

Thanks to Kate and Phil Kroker, Nancy Johnson, and Sylvia Menninga for hosting the meeting.

The next council meeting will be held in Oak Park on October 24.

Jamil Khoury, Artistic Director of Silk Road Rising, provided our July program. Silk Road Rising creates live theatre and online videos that tell stories through primarily Asian American and Middle Eastern American lenses. In representing communities that intersect and

overlap, they advance a polycultural worldview.

Jamil talked about Silk Road Rising and his latest play, Mosque Alert which tells the story of two suburban American families living in Naperville, IL—one Christian, the other Muslim—who find their lives torn apart by a proposal to build a new mosque in their community.



We viewed a short video entitled The Imam & The Homosexual (15 min, 50 sec). "The Imam and The Homosexual" probes the "strange bedfellows" political alliance between Imam Mustafa Khan (played by Khurram Mozaffar), spiritual leader of a besieged Naperville, IL mosque, and Carl Baker (played by Nicholas Cimino), the gay son of the imam's chief nemesis. As Imam Mustafa struggles to reconcile his support for civil rights with his religious and cultural objections to homosexuality, Carl imagines the Muslim and LGBT communities uniting against their common enemies.

Following the video, Jamil facilitated a discussion with the group. The video is rich and layered with conflict and topics for discussion, including exploring the true meaning of allies.

PFLAG McHenry members marched in the July Crystal Lake Parade for the 9th year in a row. The tradition of marching in Crystal Lake was the brainchild of Barbara Marian, long-time chapter member. In 2006 the rowing event of the Gay Games was held in Crystal Lake despite the loud protests of a relatively small group of people. Barbara had the idea of making the face of the LGBT community and its allies (PFLAG) very visible in the

community and entered us for the first time in the 2007 parade. Tracy Baim (Windy City Times) personally covered the event and reported on it with the headline "Crystal Lake – One Year Later."

Three years ago Barbara coordinated our participation in the Milk Days Parade in Harvard, a small farming community very near the Wisconsin border in NW McHenry County, a bastion of conservatism. Because of the large Hispanic population in Harvard, Barbara had PFLAG banners made up in both English and Spanish. She played, too, to the traditionally Roman Catholic Hispanics, carrying English and Spanish banners for Fortunate Families, a support network for Catholic parents of LGBT individuals.

With her loving and faithful spouse Jerry working tirelessly by her side, Barbara has coordinated our parade outreach for nine years, but now they are hanging up their banners and putting away their bubbles with the hope that a new, younger generation of PFLAGers will pick up the baton and carry it forward.

(http://www.impactprogram.org/). Last year, when the Impact Program was getting underway, Jae was guest speaker at a

PTI meeting. At the time the goal was to bring together a community

advisory board of transgender men and women (ages 16

and up). The purpose was to study how stigma impacts the trans community.

On Thurs., August 13th Jae will return and share with us the responses that participants provided that were relevant to their families. These cut across barriers that they encountered from their families, to receiving gender affirming care (like starting hormone replacement therapy) and stressors related to being trans or gender nonconforming (like being afraid to come out or having an unsupportive family). Hope you can all attend this very informative evening.

I would also like to share PTI's experience when we were requested to speak to the Psyche staff at Good Samaritan Hospital in June. The department was caring for more and more trans people and wanted to be sure they were being sensitive to their needs. I was accompanied by Michelle Emerick of Howard Brown Center and Dan Frett also a therapist from Guided Path Psychological Services in Palatine. In addition Josie, a friend of the LGBT community who is trans also agreed to be on our Panel addressing the staff. The panel spoke of issues including the use of proper pronouns, organizations that are helpful to the trans community and their families and mainly treating them with respect. Josie was a great inspiration and many people had many questions for her. We went over Basic Trans 101, which they were very grateful for. It was a great turnout and we have been invited to return. In addition to Support and Advocacy, Education is paramount in our goals. We need to educate as many people as we can.
