President's Column

Our Work Must Continue!

Now that marriage equality is the law of the land, it's time for PFLAG to declare itself no longer needed, to shutter up its doors and windows, and to fade into oblivion. NOT!

We are not even remotely finished yet! As long as there's even one parent left who doesn't accept their LGBTQ child, our work must continue. As long as there is still even one church that turns its back on our LGBTQ family, our work must continue. As long as there's even one senator or legislator who wants to write discrimination into law, our work must continue. PFLAG has come a long way, Baby, but it has an even longer road ahead. Our work must continue.

Which brings me to the focus of this month's column...the Fall Membership Drive.

We need money to do our work. We have to buy booklets, have brochures printed, pay for the help line, website, and post office box. We have to pay for liability insurance for all the chapters, pay the entrance fee for the Chicago Pride Parade, and pay for the float we ride on. We have to send part of the dues to the national office so that their work can continue, for we rely upon them for training, support, and printed materials. Our chapters need money to cover the cost of the outreach they do. In short, we need YOU to renew your membership or become a member for the very first time.

The basic membership is \$45, and the money is divided like this: \$15 to national, \$10 to council, and \$20 to your chapter. Other possibilities are these:

Any amount over \$45 is divided up evenly between the member's chapter and the Council.

MCHENRY CHAPTER

Dr. Michael Newcomb from IMPACT at Northwestern University's Feinberg School of Medicine was our featured speaker for August. By providing educational presentations to our membership we find that we're able to draw in faculty and staff from our local high schools, providing them with tools and information that will assist them in working with their LGBTQ students.

While Crystal Lake South High School does not have a GSA, per se, they do have a club, AEVIDUM, which helps to foster a positive and accepting atmosphere on their campus, and our chapter is supporting their endeavors.

Aevidum's goal is to create positive mental health environments where all students feel accepted, appreciated, acknowledged, and cared for in schools and communities across the nation. The word Aevidum, which means, "I've got your back," was created by students in 2004 after one of their classmates died by suicide. The Aevidum message is delivered creatively through a series of student-generated materials, interactive displays, high-energy assemblies, community events, music, artwork, stories, PSAs, etc. At the core of Aevidum is an educational philosophy that empowers students to take responsibility to make a difference. Aevidum students are encouraged to use their gifts and talents and to recognize the gifts and talents of their peers to create cultures of care in advocacy in their schools and communities. In 2009, Aevidum received SADD's National Activity of the Year award, selected from more than 10,000 schools from across the nation. Aevidum has also been recognized by the Pennsylvania Senate, Pennsylvania House, the nation's top mental health experts, the mental health directors of New York and Ohio, and professors at Penn State University, Florida State University, and the University of Maryland.

PTI CHICAGO CHAPTER

The Chicago chapter of Parents of Transgender Individuals met at the Center on Halsted on August 13 for an educational and insightful evening of discussion. Jae Puckett and Kinton Rossman who have been conducting a trans health research study at Northwestern University joined us. The study, entitled "Impact", has collected research on the LGBTQ community for over nine years and disseminates findings to the public through its website (www.impactprogram.org). Of particular note to our discussion about the website are the "Family" section and the results of the trans health study.

Jae and Kinton informed us about the Family section of the Impact website, which offers helpful topics such as a family blog, information on how to be an effective trans ally, and an educational gender identity map. Jae and Kinton then spoke about the findings from Impact's trans health study, which polled 206 respondents of various gender identities

from ages 16-73 years old. The effects of various types of stigma were studied and correlated to mental health outcomes; it was found that experiences of verbal harassment, threats of physical harm, familial rejection and discrimination in access to the appropriate bathroom were connected with higher rates of depression and anxiety among the respondents. Predictors of poor mental health outcomes included high rates of stigma, gender dysphoria and incongruence, internalized transphobia and lack of family support. Generally speaking, the study confirmed that family support is one of the most important buffers against anxiety and depression. Jae and Kinton's presentation led to a group discussion about how parents and families can be strong supports and buffers against stigma for our transgender children.

Our upcoming Sept. 10th PTI meeting at the Center on Halsted, 3656 N. Halsted Ave will start at 7pm. Our guest for the evening will be John Knight of American Civil Liberties Union(ACLU), who will discuss with us the legal rights of our transgender "kids". There will be a question and answer period and then our regular meeting will be held.

John Knight, an attorney with the ACLU, directs litigation in states in the Midwest designed to confront bias and discrimination against lesbian, gay, bisexual and transgender persons and those affected by HIV and AIDS. He successfully challenged a one of a kind Wisconsin law restricting transgender inmates access to necessary medical care, restrictions on obtaining accurate birth certificates for transgender persons born in Illinois, barriers to gay and transgender persons' ability to preserve their parental rights, among other cases. Mr. Knight speaks frequently in public about LGBT and HIV issues and helps the ACLU with outreach to local, state and federal legislators about issues affecting the LGBT community.

Hope you can attend.
