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DUPAGE CHAPTER

More than 50 people attended November's meeting to hear a panel discussion comprising 4 Transcend members that was led by Carolyn Wahlskog of Youth Outlook. Youth Outlook's Drop-In Centers meet weekly and are a social setting for youth to meet other LGBTQ+ young people and talk about a variety of topics that really matter to them. Whatever the topic, Youth Outlook's Drop-In centers provide a place for

LGBTQ+ youth to feel safe, supported, and celebrated.

Carolyn led the discussion by asking panelists a series of questions about their experiences at home, in school, and in the community. The students shared deeply personal aspects of their lives that got us thinking about the challenges that they face and what we can do to make our neighborhoods and communities more open and affirming.

We are very thankful for the number of chapter members who brought items to

support the 360 Youth Services Transitional Housing Group. They will be used to create Welcome Hampers for new residents containing items listed in the email message that we sent before the meeting. Our meeting began with an observation of the Transgender Day of Remembrance. A slide show included the video "Rise Up" by Andrea Day (https://www.youtube.com/watch?v=_Z3VoenSM4c); a listing of the names of the 25 murdered transgender individuals; and the names and pictures of the LGBTQIA+ individuals who had electoral success across the country in November: Danica Roem (VA); Phillipe Cunningham (MN); Andrea Jenkins (MN); Gerri Cannon (NH); Stephe Koontz (GA); Lisa Middleton (CA); Raven Matherne (CT); and Tyler Titus (PA). These election results are nothing short of monumental, and are both reassuring and emboldening for the many transgender people out there who are potential candidates for elected office. For far too long, transgender people were not involved in the creation of policies or laws that affect all communities, including our own.

We were able to give away two more tickets to Writers Theatre, this time for "The Importance of Being Earnest."

We were honored to host our two quests, Theresa Volpe and Mercedes Santos, the first lesbian couple whose marriage was recognized as legal by the State of Illinois. They have 3 children, 2 girls and one boy. They call themselves "normalized accidental activists." They have been together for 26 years! Their motivation began when one of their children became ill and only one 'mother' was allowed in to see their child. They applied for a marriage license and after being turned down, joined Lambda Legal 16 other couples who filed suit in the State of Illinois. After much door slamming in their faces in Springfield, they never gave up. Their suit changed minds and hearts, persuading representatives to vote yes to sponsor marriage equality. A bill was passed by the 2012 – 2013 legislature with 61 yes votes and 52 no votes. A resulting law was created affirming the legality of their marriage and other Illinois marriages that fall outside binary norms. Lambda Legal Women's Council does ongoing work as advocates of the cause. Both Theresa and Mercedes continue their advocacy working with 'Family Equality Council,' recording family stories to archive experiences for educational purposes and also with 'Proud Youth,' teaching students how to work advocacy in their lives. We were all so very impressed by the untiring commitment these women gave to the cause of marriage equality!

HINSDALE CHAPTER

Our November speaker was Amy Jakubiak, a social worker from Hinsdale Middle School. After 5 years of advocacy, she succeeded in setting up a GSA at the school. (The GSA is known as the "Safe Space Club.") She

was accompanied by Lisa, her co-sponsor and a teacher at the middle school, and two students. She related several stories showing how important this group is for her students and the school. In one case before the GSA was formed, a parent came to her to share that her husband came out. Their child, a student, was struggling and the classmates were being unkind and not supportive. They did an intervention at the school with teachers and tackled discussion topics, with opinions both supportive and not supportive. Many of the teachers had little understanding of what students coming out face and what issues arise when this happens. The intervention

emphasized that whatever a person's personal beliefs are, harassment and violence must be prevented and support for the student must be encouraged. As a result, the student felt more supported and understood.



A couple years before the GSA

began, some students approached Amy, and a group began to meet at lunch. Advocates continued to ask the school leadership, and their response was that the "school was not ready." They kept advocating and teamed up with the other district middle school. After five years, last winter they received the superintendent's approval to form the Safe Space Club. They gather all the district social workers and consulted with the school's attorney. who advised this couldn't be treated differently than any other school club or group. Fellow teachers have been very supportive, and this year there are 8 members. They make announcements like every other school club. They've created large rainbow flags with skittles, and distributed bracelets for the National Day Against Gay Discrimination. They've visiting the high school GSA and have hosted guest speakers, including a former student. They provide fellow teachers with resources to support students.

Our December meeting is our annual pot luck, followed by assembling holiday stockings for young adults who stay at The Crib, the Night Ministry's North Side shelter that welcomes homeless people 18 to 24 years old, most LGBT. We fill the stockings with socks, travel size shampoo and other toiletries, and small-denomination gift cards for places such as Subway and Dunkin Donuts. It's always a wonderful way to start the holiday season.

PTI CHICAGO CHAPTER

I can't speak highly enough of her and the assistance and support she's provided in bringing quality education about the needs of transgender students to our county school personnel.

On November 7 we sponsored a workshop geared to superintendents and principals and were very pleased that 17 people attended. These are the movers and shakers. Get them on board, and progress is truly possible.

When asked why they were attending the workshop, one superintendent responded by saying that he didn't want his school district to be at the top of one of AJ Jenning's (IL Safe Schools Alliance) power point slides! AJ had just finished discussing several Illinois school districts that had had "issues" with providing equal access to facilities for transgender students. His response brought knowing nods and chuckles from the others in the room.

Our December meeting will be themed "Coming Home for the Holidays" and will center on a discussion of issues faced by LGBTQ+ people and their loved ones when having to deal with less than accepting relatives at holiday gatherings.
