D211 (Palatine) Considering New Locker Room Policy

On September 19th, the District 211 Board of Education (Palatine) held a well-attended public meeting to introduce a proposed policy in the district that allows all students – including students who are transgender – full and equal use of all facilities, including locker rooms. After four long years of controversy and battles, this is an incredible moment.

Hundreds of supporters of transgender rights – and the group D211 Parents for Privacy – attended the meeting, with many signing up for the opportunity to speak and share their views with the Board. The remarks of supporters were inspiring and engaging – while opponents relied largely on the tired, old arguments we have heard in the past.

At the end of the evening, some Board members expressed an interest in understanding more fully how the policy will be implemented. While we hoped the policy would be adopted in October, it now appears that the final vote may not take place until November. But we will not relent, and we will continue to show up and speak out for all students.

We will let you know the details of the next meeting when they become public. In the interim, thank you for your support.

COURT MATTERS

U.S. 6th Circuit Court of Appeals upholds ruling that state of Kentucky must pay four same-sex couples' legal fees and costs for refusing to issue them marriage licenses in 2015 after the Obergefell ruling by SCOTUS. The Appeals ruling upheld the federal district court's ruling from 2017 that former Rowan County clerk Kim Davis rightfully could be sued for her actions not to issue marriage licenses to the four couples.

SCOTUS to hear oral arguments on Title VII cases on October 8th. The day of oral arguments will include a rally at SCOTUS featuring comments from organizations who submitted amicus briefs, including PFLAG National, and other civil rights leaders. The ruling would be on whether Title VII's protections apply to LGBTQ+ employees. PFLAG National's position is that Title VII protections, as affirmed in prior court rulings and in guidance by the EEOC, do include gender identity and expression as well as sexual orientation under the protections regarding sex and sex stereotyping.

MEDIA MATTERS

Transgender individuals subjected to conversion therapy more at risk of psychological distress than their non-trans peers, study finds. A new study published in monthly, peer-reviewed JAMA Psychiatry by the American Medical Association, analyzed more than 27,000 transgender adults.

New study reported in journal of Science finds there is no single "gay gene." The study analyzed the DNA of nearly a half a million people and found that, while genetic differences play a significant role in sexual behavior, there's no single "gay gene," calls into question such sexual orientation frameworks as the Kinsey scale, and hints at the complex factors that influence human sexuality, including society and the environment. PFLAG National's Latinx Heritage Month video makes the news. The video features members of PFLAG En Espanol in Los Angeles and is directed by award-winning filmmaker Nick Oceano, whose feature directorial debut "Pedro," the MTV biopic about AIDS activist Pedro Zamora (a cast-member of MTV's "The Real World") was nominated for several awards.

PFLAG at Abbvie Ally Week

On September 24th, PFLAG was invited to organize a discussion panel at the Abbvie Ally Week. PFLAG volunteers were joined by allies working at Abbvie, forming a diverse team of ten panelists. Toni Weaver moderated the discussion, which Abbvie videotaped and broadcast to other corporate locations. The event was well-received by the audience.

News from PFLAG Hinsdale

Our speaker on September 1st was Amy Orwig and her husband Doug. Amy's presentation, *Evolution of a Mama Bear* was about a mom who found strength in the kindness of strangers, and became stronger in the process."

Amy's journey into the LGBTQIA community began 3 years ago when their youngest son Ryan came out at age 17. He told his father he was bisexual. When Doug told Amy what their son had said, she thought Ryan must be confused. After all, he had been home schooled and active in Boy Scouts.

Amy searched Google to look for answers as to what a Christian parent should do if their child comes out as gay. Some of the answers she found, including one that said you should kick your child out of your home, were not helpful.

Amy had an uncle who came out as gay back in the late 1970s. Her grandmother, who was a Christian conservative, had a hard time accepting her son's "choices". There were few resources available to parents of gay children at that time. Her grandmother did not kick her uncle out of the house, but he did turn to drugs as a way of dealing with his situation. Amy also had a half-brother who came out as gay in the mid-1980s during the AIDs epidemic.

One of Amy's search results for answers was a Facebook site, "Just Because They Breathe," founded by Christian parents, Linda Mueller Robertson and her husband Robert. The Robertson's 17 year old son came out as gay in a text he sent to his parents. The Robertson's tried prayer as a way to work through this. When their son, turned 18, he moved out of the house. He did return home, but sadly he passed away from an accidental drug overdose. The Robertson's wanted to use their tragedy to create something beautiful for other parents who were trying to understand their gay children.

Amy was hesitant to join a Facebook group because

she feared everyone would find out about Ryan being gay.

She spent several weeks reading posts from thousands of women from all over the world. Finally, she decided to join the group and introduce herself.

As time went on, Amy became more comfortable with, Ryan's bisexuality. The encouragement and insights she gained from other mother's experiences with their gay children helped Amy better understand her child.

Four to five months later, on Ryan's 18th birthday, he sent his parents a text telling them that he was transgender. Ryan's chosen name became Chloe. Over time, Amy and Doug adjusted to Chloe's transition and learned to love and accept Chloe as she is.

In 3 short years, Amy has gone from joining 3 LGBTQIA groups to now being part of 6 groups. She started *Q Collective*, a teen group in her area, as a way for Chloe to meet more people like herself. She has also formed a parents' support group and a PFLAG chapter in Peoria where she is the president, helped bring Pride Fest back to Peoria after a 5-year hiatus, and had been cochair of *Free Mom Hugs Illinois*.

Our scheduled speaker for Oct. 6th is Lorena Cory, who organized a play group for transgender children called *Pinwheels*.

News from PFLAG Deerfield

We had an outstanding speaker this month: Scout Bratt (pronoun: they), the Outreach and Education Director from the Chicago Women's Health Center.

CWHC has served Chicago communities with pride for more than four decades. In 1975, a group of health care providers, counselors and health educators, troubled by unjust gynecological care disparities in Chicago, joined together to create CWHC. Emphasizing self-knowledge and a peer approach to health care, these early collective members believed that health care was a right, not a privilege, and that gender inequality was a serious barrier to respectful health care. This history and perspective lends CWHC strength and perspective as a leader in reproductive justice and compassionate, collaborative and comprehensive health care.

The CWHC found what needs were not being met from mainstream health providers. They started with gynecology, realizing that time spent one on one doctor to patient was about 7 minutes. They expanded to include queer affirming, trans inclusive "clients", not patients, to one hour long appointments. With the CWHC you can expect: collaboration of care providers, no government funding, no identification needed, sliding scale payment, no proof of income, no insurance needed, private insurance accepted, client created payment plans. CWHC believes all deserve health care services, no matter what their gender identity! Their funding comes from individual donations and foundations. No one is turned away because of lack of ability to pay.

Some of the services provided are basic gynecology, alternative insemination, feminist therapy, (how gender and sexuality play a role in family life), primary care, outreach and education, acupuncture and massage, trans greater access project and sex education.

A repeat of the training is scheduled for February 5 since demand exceeded supply in terms of space! Initially our focus was on providing LGBTQ+ training to school personnel; now we are branching out into other segments of the community.

News from PFLAG Rockford

We welcomed a few newcomers to our monthly meeting with 14 in attendance. After introductions, we had fun sharing what we are passionate about, with examples like: self-care, mental health awareness, LGBTQ+ rights in the workplace, public speaking in high schools, healing the divide with LGBTQ+ rights in the medical field, elderly LGBTQ+ rights, crafting, and giving back to the community.

What We've Been Up To

Meg was interviewed by WREX on August 12th in regard to Governor Pritzker's order for inclusive curriculum in schools. Much was said in the interview, but little was aired. Regardless, we are grateful for the supportive momentum our State's politicians are demonstrating.

I have been working with State Legislators regarding the school inclusive curriculum. This work will protect transgender students, so they have equality in all public schools. One local example is how Harlem School District has incorporated them. There will be a task force created to focus on this initiative. We can't wait to see the results.

The DiversCITY queer youth group facilitators have been scheduling dates for special activities for the teens, including: pumpkin carving (pumpkins being donated by Schnucks), a Drag 101 workshop, a Sip and Paint night, a museum tour, and a field trip to RAD and GEM for Jan. 2020. Meg acquired a DUNS number and registered us with SAM in order to gain the grant money we were awarded.

School Presentation Requests: Harlem High School reached out and requested a PFLAG presentation in their Women's Study class on October 28th. Amber, Brit and myself will share education and advocacy related to the LGBTQ+ population. Durand Schools would like a presentation at their Parent/Teacher Conference days. Amber and myself will fill this request on Nov. 7th.

PFLAG Rockford President Updates:

- I have been working on getting the website back up and running since it expired, and we did not have access to our account due to it being registered to a former board member. Thankfully, the domain name has been saved for us. But unfortunately, our information was lost. We need to re-make our website from scratch. If you have any interest in website building, please get a hold of me.
- PFLAG National Convention is coming up. I did not get a scholarship this time to attend. I asked for money to be allocated to fund my attendance. The PFLAG Board voted yes to allow me to use PFLAG funds of \$285 for conference attendance. I am registered and excited to attend Kansas City for my second national conference.
- I presented the group with a new PFLAG Rockford position, the *Transition Support Coordinator*. I would like to fulfill this position. The position includes things I have already been doing in the community: taking people to Howard Brown, taking them to court for name changes, accompanying to appointments, helping answers questions about changing documents get them information pamphlets, etc. The group agreed this would be a great addition.
- I also discussed my attendance at the Philadelphia
 Trans Wellness Conference (held from Jul 25, 2019

 Jul 27, 2019) I will be furthering a discussion
 with the Trevor Project on how to encourage
 parents/caregivers not to "grieve" someone who is
 transitioning because it assigns a negativity to the
 transition. We need to have more neutral words
 while talking about this.
- I discussed fundraising efforts for Liam's Name Change Fund. I have decided I would like to start a separate organization for this effort and not officially run it through our chapter.
- Illinois Safe School Alliance is partnering with another organization to help fund their initiative, so I wrote a letter of support to ISSA on behalf of our chapter.

We are exploring ways to connect with other local organizations in hopes to identify how our organization intersects with theirs and how we can work together.

 At this meeting, Meg relayed that she's reached out to Eliminate Racism 815. Eliminate racism invited us to their meetings but have not yet confirmed whether or not they are available to be guest speakers or attend our meetings. Paige, a new Board Member, has agreed to attend their October meeting in hopes to bridge that communication.

- Meg also reached out to Just Breathe 815, but has not heard back. Curt will try to get a hold of the organizer.
- Meg also reached out to Xavier Whitford and she will be joining us for October's meeting to speak about Mental Health Awareness.
- Amber reached out to Children's Home + Aid and NAMI and they will be giving a Trauma Presentation at November's PFLAG Meeting.
- It was suggested by Curt, that we add the Junior League and League of Women's Voters to our connection efforts.

Curt provided our financial updates, with our current balance at \$4231.29 Curt and Amber discussed the finishing touches on deducting Queer Prom expenses for the grant's Final Report.

At this meeting, Meg presented on Suicide Awareness Week. She shared with us about suicide myths and facts, symptoms and warning signs, behavioral clues, and tips for asking the suicide question.

Other Updates

Our PFLAG Adult Peer Support Group needs a new facilitator. Paige has agreed to fill this role and became

a new PFLAG Rockford Board Member! YAY! She'll use this survey to find out what are the best days/times for a support group. Please use <u>this link</u> to access the survey.

Paige also updated us on UIC happenings. Paige wants help from us to find transgender women of color for her schools Medical Colloquium.

Lien reported her progress at RVC. RVC is tweaking the technology to add in "Preferred Names" in their student identifications but the gender is still the same. The PAIC group (Promoting an Inclusive Community) is still meeting and a November event is in the works. They're hoping to hold an LGBTQ two-week event from Nov 11-22. One display will be a photography exhibit titled "Love Makes a Family" that highlights LGBTQ families. Lien would welcome PFLAG Rockford to run workshops for PFLAG.

DiversCity Youth Group: Our monthly session will be held on **October 9th**, **6:00pm-8:00pm at the Nordlof**. We will be carving pumpkins. DiversCity is a safe space for LGBTQ+ youth and their allies ages 13-19.

This month we had as our speaker Kyle Bullock, MSW, a licensed social worker who heads the year-old *Polaris* program at Garfield Park Behavioral Hospital. Kyle brings much experience to the program, including as the author of a transgender student guidebook for educators. Polaris' motto is "A guiding light for youth" and they work specifically with LGBTQ+ teens (ages 12-17) on a short-term inpatient basis. Any teen in this category with mental health challenges can be part of Polaris, which--as Kyle described it--is "genderless". Pronouns are not only adhered to, but honored. News from PFLAG DuPage

Because we were out of town for the September meeting, Gail Hanson graciously volunteered to lead the meeting. Her presentation recognized the start of a new school year by focusing on education. In our continuing effort to insure safe learning spaces for ALL students, she showed two films produced by Welcoming Schools.

The first video viewed, titled *What Do You Know?*, was produced for elementary school educators and parents/caregivers. This video featured students discussing what they know and hear about LGBTQ people and how teachers can help them learn correct information about these topics.

The second video, titled *What Can We Do?*, is a training film that features experienced teachers engaging students using lesson plans to address the topics of bias, bullying, and how to stand up for each other.

As a reminder to all that October is the beginning of a new fiscal year for PFLAG. Don Donahue reminded all current members of the importance of renewing their memberships and encouraged all new attendees to give consideration to becoming members. He explained the purpose and focus of the National PFLAG office and the benefits and purpose of our chapter's participation in the PFLAG Northern Illinois Council.

Gail expressed thanks to Steve Rothmond for being our point person in the Naperville Labor Day parade and for all who participated in representing PFLAG at this annual event.

Peter and Kristin Shulman announced that October 13th will be the first official meeting of the new Bolingbrook chapter and invited all to attend. We greatly appreciate the effort they have devoted to making this new chapter a reality and providing support to the communities in the Bolingbrook area.

Information was shared regarding the 9/19/19 meeting of the District 211 school board at which there would be consideration given to adopting a new policy that affords full and equal access to locker rooms for students who are transgender. Carolyn Wahlskog, Executive Director of Housing at 360 Youth Network encouraged as many as possible to attend the meeting and show support for this policy. This district has

experienced 4 years of stubborn resistance and it was expected that P4P planned to have a large number of supporters at the meeting in opposition to this new policy.

The recent passage of HB0246 was recognized and celebrated. This bill now requires the history of LGBTQ people in history be included in Illinois public school curriculum.







But in life there are always exceptions. What are the unintended consequences of strict gender rules on the individual and the community as a whole? What happens when rules are broken?


We are a better society when people are free to be who they are and their contributions are accepted and valued. That is the message of *The Witch Boy*.
